MARSH MEMORIAL CARILLON

Perched atop Marsh Hall (administration building,) the Marsh Memorial Carillon commands attention by sight and sound. The late Joseph F. Marsh, Jr., president emeritus of Concord, donated the world-class instrument to the University. The Marsh Memorial Carillon is West Virginia's only true carillon with 48 bells and a four-octave musical range. The largest bell, called the bourdon, weighs 4,310 pounds. A true carillon has no electrical amplification and consists of at least 23 tuned, cast bronze bells. Concord's carillon was dedicated and installed in 1997.

Marsh's Concord legacy continues with gift from estate

The late Joseph F. Marsh Jr. served his alma mater Concord University in numerous capacities including as president and president emeritus.

And now, even after his death, his impact on the institution he loved continues.

Marsh, who passed away on Friday, Dec. 11, 2009, bequeathed to Concord University 60 percent of his residual estate and his real estate in Athens, altogether valued at nearly three million dollars. The principal purpose of the bequest is to sustain the music program of the university and, if funds permit, University Point and other projects that may be identified by the Board of Governors of the university.

Dr. Jerry Beasley, Concord University president emeritus and executor of Marsh's estate, said the gift not only signifies Marsh's devotion to Concord, but also the continuation of a legacy begun by his father, Joseph F. Marsh Sr., when he served as Concord's president.

"During his life, Dr. Marsh demonstrated a rare kind of moral courage that often required personal sacrifice. He never flinched from the challenge," Beasley said. "He urged students and all he knew to drink deeply from the fountain of knowledge; 'don't gargle,' he often said with a twinkle in his eye.

"Together, members of the Marsh family will provide noble examples for future generations of Concordians to emulate. We honor their memory by devoting ourselves to the high principles on which they built their lives," he said.

Concord University President Gregory F. Aloia said the gift begins yet another chapter in the Marsh story at Concord and will benefit the university community for years to come.

"Dr. Marsh was a revered leader of Concord and was instrumental in its transformation as a modern university," Aloia said.

"His leadership of Concord was seen in many ways including his lifelong dedication to its well-being, his support of our foundation, his love of our students and the beautiful bell tower," he said.



Mountain Lion locker room named in honor of Hillman



Concord University recognized an alumnus for his dedication by naming the school's football locker room in his honor.

An afternoon ceremony outside the Carter Center Aug. 26, 2010 saluted North Carolina businessman **Eric H. Hillman, '83** for supporting his alma mater and Mountain Lion Athletics. A plaque unveiled during the program designates the space the "Eric H. Hillman/Jeffery D. Compton Football Locker Room." The locker room was renovated last year.

Hillman is a 1983 graduate of Concord and an active Sigma Tau Gamma alumnus. He is co-founder, co-owner and CEO of Europa Sports Products, one of the largest sports supplement distributors in the country.

Hillman's achievement and leadership in his profession and his entrepreneurial vision in the health/nutrition industry have resulted in multiple "Entrepreneur of the Year" nominations and company growth awards.

"I learned a lot about business from the fraternity," Hillman said during the program. "What Concord did for me was incredible."

Concord University Director of Athletics Kevin Garrett served as master of ceremonies for the naming event. Remarks were offered by Concord University President Gregory F. Aloia and Mountain Lion Head Football Coach Mike Kellar.

Among the guests were members of the Mountain Lion Club, Inc; members of Sigma Tau Gamma Fraternity; and Concord representatives.

And, to top off that news, the event has been named one of the Top 100 Events in North America for 2011 by the American Bus Association.

At the helm of this successful West Virginia destination is Marlene Pierson-Jolliffe '87. Now the fair's manager, Pierson-Jolliffe began her career there as a high school senior in the exhibits department.

Study abroad trip part of Concord's international initiative

This summer, 10 Concord University students traveled alongside Dr. Joseph Manzo, professor of geography, and Dr. He-Boong Kwon, associate professor of business, to Korea and Japan on a study abroad trip.

These CU students teamed up with six other students from various countries in order to study the Korean culture. Students attended classes based on language, art, geography, history and traditional music. The students also participated in additional field trips to Seoul, The Sea of Japan and the DMZ.

Dr. Manzo says that this trip was very successful. "Our students this year left a nice legacy for others to follow behind," he said.

Senior Andrea Lannom was one of the Concord students who traveled abroad. She had been to England with a study abroad trip the previous summer and now describes the desire to see other countries as "insatiable."

For students who are interested in international travel, Lannom says that you don't always have to know a lot of background about the country. "You may bring biases with you that are untrue about that country. You can learn more just by being there," she said.

Lannom says although studying abroad isn't for everyone, everyone can get something out of it. She described the friendships that formed between the group members and how they all learned from each other. She says you may even be surprised what you learn about yourself.

Manzo says that this trip, as well as many other study abroad trips, was made possible in large part due to several partnerships that Concord has with other universities in various countries. Seven partnerships exist currently, with more soon to be established.

These partnerships offer Concord students the opportunity to study another country's culture, as well as affording that opportunity to international students. Room and board, along with classes and lectures, will be, in most cases, handled by the host country. Manzo says that these exchanges are very closely equal in value, and the partnerships have been created in order to be mutually beneficial to both institutions. Because of Korea's hospitality, Concord has welcomed two Korean students to study here for a year.



Concord University President Gregory Aloia has established an International Initiative Council chaired by Dr. Manzo. Partnerships with Korea, Japan, Puerto Rico and Russia are all a part of that initiative. Three goals for this council have been established by President Aloia: to create more opportunities for Concord students,

to create more opportunities for Concord faculty, and to diversify the culture on Concord's campus.

Dr. Manzo says that many international students find Concord University because of the internet. Part of the job of this council is to find a way to be more proactive in the recruiting process. Students on campus can benefit from learning another student's culture, while international students are able to have an "American experience."

The entire Concord University community lost a dear friend with the passing of Mary Edna Beckett. At the time of her death she was Professor of Mathematics Emerita and Second Vice President of the Concord University Alumni Association, Inc.

Mary Edna was a resident of Beckett Hill Road in Athens. Born in Logan County, West Virginia, Aug. 31, 1932, she was the daughter of the late Bernard O. "Bob" and Margaret Edna Gannon Beckett.

Mary Edna retired from Concord University in 2005 following 46 years of faithful service. She was a 1950 graduate and Valedictorian of Concord Training School and received her B.S. Degree in Education from Concord College in 1954 and her master's degree from West Virginia University in 1959. Prior to starting her college career teaching mathematics and mathematics education at Concord College in 1959, she taught for the Mercer County School System at both Ramsey Jr. High and Central Jr. High in Bluefield. Mary Edna was well respected by her students and her peers serving several terms as Concord Faculty President and as chairperson of the Division of Natural Sciences.

She was active in the Concord College Alumni Association having served as treasurer and as a member of the Executive Council. The Concord Alumni Association awarded her "Alumnus of The Year" and "Golden Alumnus of The Year" honors during her years of service. She was the founder and sponsor of the Cardinal Key National Honorary Society for outstanding Concord students on campus and each year organized the Honors Banquet while serving on the Commencement committee.

Mary Edna was also a respected and active member of the Athens community. In 1995 she was honored with the "Total Community Involvement Award" by the Athens-Concord Town Social committee. That same year she was named Athens Woman's Club "Citizen of The Year." She was also a member of numerous professional organizations.

Concord 'great place to get a start' for accomplished alum

Vondracek readily acknowledges the role a Concord education played in his accomplishments. "I've always been grateful to Concord for getting me started on my academic career and being successful in my profession," the State College, Pa., resident said. "It was a great place to get a start."

Matriculating at Concord, he said, was an "act of faith" for someone who had only attained an eighth grade education in his native Germany before immigrating to the United States to

live with relatives and unable to speak English. The people he encountered in his new home, he said, helped with the transition.

"I found West Virginians to be extremely welcoming, helpful and friendly and that made it so much easier for me to focus on my studies and do well," he said.

Young Fred lived in an apartment above the Sweet Shop, took an advanced English composition class from Dr. William Ofsa that he credits with helping him build confidence writing in English and graduated in three years.

He completed his master's and doctorate degrees in psychology from Penn State in four years. Following an internship in Salem, Va. with the U.S. Veterans Administration Hospital, he joined Penn State's Division of Individual and Family Studies in the College of Human Development.

In "A Legacy of Compassion and Leadership Continues after Retirement," an article by The College of Health and Human Development, Vondracek is applauded as an educator, administrator, researcher, author and innovator and recognized as an outstanding mentor and colleague. "Now a professor emeritus of human development, Vondracek had a profound impact on the people he worked with and on the University as a whole. He held a multitude of academic leadership roles, helped shape and build a department and a college, broadened Penn State's international reach, and paved the way to improve work-life balance for Penn State employees.

Before he became an academic leader, though, Vondracek was on a vastly different career path. Growing up outside of Cologne, Germany, he had trained to be a tile setter and stone mason. After finishing an apprenticeship, he felt that manual labor was not a good fit for his career (though it has remained a lifelong hobby). So he moved to the United States—even though he could not speak English. The language barrier, however, was no major obstacle. He enrolled in the Psychology program at Concord College in Athens, West Virginia, and received his undergraduate degree in three years, while mastering English and working to pay his tuition fees.

...due to Vondracek's and other faculty members' contributions, Penn State's HDFS program stands as a leader in educating human services professionals and training world class researchers. Vondracek also initiated a change that would revolutionize Penn State's child services programs...Because of Vondracek's efforts...Penn State made a commitment to create full-time child care centers... both of which are renowned for their high-quality services...

Vondracek's deep compassion for the people he worked with is equally as impressive. 'Fred is a brilliant man, who is also extremely generous and understanding,' says Dr. Erik Porfeli '04g HDFS, assistant professor of behavioral and community and health sciences at the Northeastern Ohio Universities Colleges of Medicine and Pharmacy. 'He is very unique—he combines a strong intellect with a strong compassion.' "

Puckett's career dedicated to community service

Thanks to the leadership efforts of Concord alum Greg Puckett '93 Mercer County, West Virginia has reason to celebrate – again.

Puckett and his team of colleagues in the Creating Opportunities For Youth (COFY) Coalition have secured for the county, for the fourth consecutive time, designation as one of the 100 Best Communities for Young People by America's Promise Alliance. Mercer County is the only West Virginia community to be recognized for 2010.

This year's list of recipients was announced during a ceremony on the National Mall in Washington, D.C. on Sept. 21.



The recognition program aims to increase access to resources for young people to succeed in life: caring adults, safe places, a healthy start, effective education and opportunities to help others. The award acknowledges efforts to improve overall wellbeing for young Americans and increase high school graduation rates.

Puckett, a lifelong Mercer County resident, is executive director of Community Connections, Inc. In the post, he said he is responsible for "oversight of the prevention system within the county as well as reaching out and working with community groups locally and statewide."

"In the office we run or have oversight for five state associations," he said.

According to Puckett, COFY unites efforts of businesses, youth, parents and schools across the community in areas like substance abuse prevention, health issues and other topics tied to the well-being of youth.

"I'm very blessed to be part of a group...that wants to do the best for the community as a whole...I've been so blessed, I've been so lucky," he said.

A personal and professional philosophy bound to strong community service and involvement and backed by an untiring determination to succeed motivates Puckett and helped him in securing the "100 Best" honor for his home county.

"Community and civic involvement is everything...we should transition life to that...it's a mission we all should have," he said.

"If I can impart one thing on youth, it's to look forward to a career and never ever leave your community, be a part of it. It's the most rewarding thing you can do," he said. "It's very important for people, even at a very young age to leave a legacy.

"You can do anything you want to. Never take no for an answer. Be aggressive, but not pushy. Do what's right," he said. "God has given us the ability to do amazing things."

One of those "amazing things" in his own life, he said, is being a member of the West Virginia Blazers, the state's only professional basketball team. "It's taken me literally around the world," he said. Puckett and his teammates traveled to China in February.

While tackling and enjoying the physical challenges of the game, Puckett said he also works with his teammates to "show the guys how to be mentors to youth."

His work with COFY and Community Connections also extends to his alma mater by supporting tobacco use prevention initiatives on campus as well as working with the collegiate SADD program.

Puckett is a second generation Concord graduate. His mother, Sandra Stowers Puckett, is also an alum. He received a bachelor's degree in communication arts from Concord. As a student, he served on the activities board, worked in the bookstore and participated in theater department events. He has also coached the Concord C-Lions Swim Team.

He has two children, Lauren, 7, and Joseph, 4.

Football

The Concord football team opened its season with a 72-21 win over Southern Virginia at Callaghan Stadium on Aug. 26, and followed that up with a down-to-the-wire 20-17 win at Lenoir-Rhyne on Sept. 4.

Concord suffered its first defeat on Sept. 18, falling 20-13 at surprising West Virginia Wesleyan.

The Mountain Lions recovered to defeat Charleston, 37-28, on Sept. 25 in Athens, then cruised to a 42-18 road win at West Virginia State the next week. Concord lost at then-unbeaten Shepherd on Oct. 9, 49-35, in a wildly entertaining game full of big plays and drastic momentum swings.

CU thrilled a near-capacity Homecoming crowd with a 49-14 triumph over Glenville State at Callaghan Stadium on Oct. 16.

Concord captured three WVIAC Player of the Week awards over the season's first seven games. Running back Brian Kennedy was the Offensive POTW for Sept. 4, while wide receiver Thomas Mayo got the honor for Sept. 25. Kicker Brandon Strupp was Special Teams POTW for Oct. 16.

The Mountain Lions visited Seton Hill on Oct. 23 and came back from Greensburg, Pa. with a 28-17 victory. The next week's road trip garnered a 30-26 win against North Carolina-Pembroke on Oct. 30.

The Mountain Lions earned the title of 2010 Rotary Bowl Champs with a 41-17 victory over Fairmont State at Hunnicutt Stadium in Princeton Nov. 6. CU closed out the season at home with a 56-33 loss to West Liberty Nov. 13.

The Mountain Lions go on the record books with an impressive 8-3 2010 season.

Men's Golf

Concord's men's golf team put together a dominating fall campaign and made history along the way.

The Mountain Lions swept all three West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference tournaments, culminating with a stunning 52-stroke victory in the WVIAC Championships Oct. 17-19 at the Cobb Course at Glade Springs Resort in Daniels.

Concord's 881 team total set a new league record for lowest score in a 54-hole tournament, breaking the old mark by a noteworthy six strokes.

Mountain Lions senior Emmanuel Charmat led CU's individual performances by winning Medalist honors at the last two WVIAC tournaments. Charmat won the Northern Regional (Oct. 10-11), with Andreas Reideborn second and Ryan Terdik third. At the Championships, Charmat ended at 2-under par 214 and was the only player to finish in the "red numbers." Terdik was third, Matt Morgan fourth and Johan Isberg seventh.

Concord's win in the WVIAC Championships was the fifth in program history and automatically qualifies the Mountain Lions for the NCAA Atlantic/East Regional tournament in May 2011.

Cross Country

Concord's cross country teams enjoyed a successful 2010 regular season.

The women's team won championships at the Greensboro Pacesetters meet on Sept. 25 and the Concord Invitational on Homecoming Saturday, Oct. 16. Senior Danielle Pye was the top individual in both those meets, and was named WVIAC Women's Runner of the Week on Sept. 29.

Pye and teammate Chelsea Callaway became the first two women's runners in CU history to post times under 19 minutes in a 5K in the Greater Louisville Classic on Oct. 2.



Pye and Callaway finished 1-2 at the Concord Invitational, with CU's Rachel Williams and Shawnee Carnett 4th and 5th.

The Concord men were champions of the Greensboro Pacesetters meet and runners-up at the Concord Invitational. The Mountain Lions were an impressive 8th in the 34-team "Blue Division" of the Greater Louisville Classic.

Robby Peters was CU's top individual performer, finishing 2nd in Greensboro and at the Concord Invitational.

Both Concord teams spent the fall ranked squarely in the WVIAC's top five. Pye, Callaway and Peters were consistently ranked among the conference's top ten individuals.

At the 2010 WVIAC Cross Country Championships the Concord women made history by winning their first team championship with an impressive score of 49 points. Pye won the 6K race with a time of 23:14. In the men's 8K race Concord placed 3rd with 70 points. Peters, a junior, led the way for the men with a 6th place finish and a time of 26:51.

Soccer

CU's women's soccer team started the season 0-3 under new head coach Stefani Workman, but rebounded to become one of the WVIAC's top squads. After their slow start, the Lady Lions reeled off eight wins in their next 11 matches to secure a spot in the conference tournament.

Concord made a habit of flourishing in close contests. The Lady Lions were 4-1 in one-goal games (through Oct. 20), claiming three victories in overtime.

2010 was a fall of frustration for Concord's Men's Soccer team. Over their first 12 matches, the Mountain Lions went to overtime four times, winding up with a loss and three draws. Also over those dozen games, Concord suffered four 1-0 losses.

CU broke into the win column with a hard-fought 2-1 final at Bluefield College on Oct. 16.

Concord will lose just one senior, Varney Vincent, from this year's team, and the slew of returning players is raising hopes for improvement in 2011.

Volleyball

In volleyball, Concord moved toward securing a return to the WVIAC Tournament by winning three of its first six league matches.

The Lady Lions recovered from a bout of early injuries to win six of nine matches overall from Sept. 25-Oct. 15, including conference victories over Ohio Valley, Alderson-Broaddus and Glenville State.

Senior Amber Miller led Concord in kills, averaging more than eight per match. Junior Helen Theisen emerged as CU's most versatile player, providing 18 assists, seven digs and four kills per match.

Tennis

CU's women's tennis team went 3-6 in the WVIAC fall campaign, good for the 7th seed in the conference tournament. Concord defeated Davis & Elkins, Seton Hill and Bluefield State in league play, setting up a rematch with D&E in the first round of the post-season.

Concord's men's tennis team played an abbreviated schedule in the fall, sweeping all four of their matches. In defeating Emory & Henry, Tiffin, Johnson C. Smith and West Virginia State, the Mountain Lions won 31 matches and lost only five.

Basketball

Both Concord University basketball teams began practice on Oct. 15 and are already into regular season play. The Lady Lions return eight regulars, including five starters from last year's 15-win squad. The Concord men bring back seven regulars and five starters to go with a group of promising newcomers.
