Helpful Hints

- Semester 1—Take any math class 101 or above .If MATH103 is chosen, another MATH101 or above course must be taken Semester 2.
- •Semester 1—You may choose either *GEOL*101 *or PHSC104*: Concepts in Physical Science: Earth/Space Sciences. Students may choose to take BIOL101 this semester, and one of these Physical Science courses Semester 3 instead of the order listed here.
- •Semester 2 Students must take GEOG101 as one of their General Education Social & Behavioral Science coursework. Students may choose to take a different Social & Behavioral Science course this semester, and take GEOG101 during a later semester, instead of the order listed here.
- •Semester 3— EDSP365 and EDSP370 must be taken concurrently. These are <u>Fall Only</u> offerings
- •Semester 3 Landmark—Students should begin taking the Praxis Core Exams no later than this semester. Core Praxis prep course and study material/information available on CU Department of Education webpage. By the end of this semester, students should obtain an overall GPA of at lest 2.50 in order to apply for the Teacher Education Program during Semester 4.
- •Semester 4 EDSP317 and EDSP318 must be taken concurrently. These are <u>Spring Only</u> offerings
- •Semester 4 Landmark—Students should apply to the Teacher Education Program no later than this semester. Note—candidates must have a 2.5 GPA to apply. Check out the application process online!
- •Special Education majors must take GEOG101: Human Geography as one of their General Education: Social & Behavioral Science courses

ADVISING

When you choose to pursue this degree, you will be assigned an advisor who is an expert in the field of Special Education. This advisor can help you with course selection, career planning, resume building, and help you with tracking your path to degree completion.

CAREERS

This degree prepares teacher candidates to teach in the K-12 classroom. Graduates of the Teacher Education Program are eligible for licensure in West Virginia, and in other states through reciprocal agreements.

COMPLIMENTARY MINORS

Students who pursue a degree in Special Education should consider pursuing a complimentary minor in Early Childhood Intervention . Upon obtaining their initial teaching license, students have the option to take a Praxis II exam in these areas to add an endorsement to their license. The minor coursework provides the content knowledge to pass the Praxis II exams.

Helpful Hints

- •Semester 6— EDSP412, EDSP413 and EDSP414 must be taken concurrently. EDSP380 is a <u>spring</u> even year only offering
- •Semester 6 Landmark—Students should begin taking PLT & Praxis II exams no later than this semester. These must all be passed prior to Semester 8. By the end of this semester students must obtain all GPAs require for Year Long Residency admission. Refer to admission requirements listed on the Department of Education webpage!
- •Semesters 8 & 9—Year-Long Residency. The Special Education program participates in a year-long residency model. This model enables teacher candidates to spend a year in the same classroom with the same students and cooperating teacher. This model has proven to deepen the professional relationships within the school as well provide teacher candidates with more practical experiences over longer periods to of time. Our candidates report feeling more effective and confident during their first year of teaching. During Semester 7 students will be in a public school classroom 4 days per week. During semester 8, students will be in a public school classroom 5 days per week.
- •Courses marked with an asterisk are part of the Special Education content area, and will also be counted for General Education Program coursework. Other majors allow for flexibility in General Education coursework, but the Special Education Program does not; students must take the designated courses.
