The WV Collegiate Recovery Network and Concord Collegiate Recovery Coach Brandon Whitehouse are hosting several informational events at Concord during September.

Naloxone education training will be offered on Wednesday, Sept. 8 from 5 p.m. to 6 p.m.

in the State Room. This training will provide educational information on Naloxone which is "a safe and easy to use medication that can save the life of a person overdosing on opioids" according to information provided by CU's Collegiate Recovery. To register for the training, please follow this link.

Prevention Day will be celebrated on Wednesday, Sept. 15 from 12:30 p.m. to 3 p.m. in the Ground Floor Lobby of the Student Center. The Collegiate Recovery Network is partnering with Community Connections, Jobs for Hope and Southern Highlands to bring prevention awareness tools and resource information to students, faculty and staff at Concord University.

Recovery Day, a time to celebrate the journey of those in recovery, will be held on Wednesday, Sept. 22 from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the Student Center's Ground Floor Lobby. "Only around 40-60 percent of people with substance use disorders recover without relapse," Whitehouse states. "Help us spend the day to honor those who have climbed the mountain."

The Concord campus community is also invited to attend the 2nd WV Collegiate Recovery Conference on Friday, Sept. 24. This event will be held from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the West Virginia Building Annex on the State Fairgrounds in Lewisburg, W.Va. The overall goal of this conference is to bring awareness that pursuing higher education is for everyone and that support through collegiate recovery programs is available to help students succeed in both their sobriety and educational goals. 
Scholarly Activities Take Faculty Beyond the Classroom

Dr. Jonathan Berkey

On Aug. 20, Professor of History Jonathan Berkey (along with Shenandoah University's Jonathan Noyalas) presented "Fighting for Freedom: Black Activism in the Civil War-era Lower Shenandoah Valley." The presentation was part of the Virtual Virginia Forum Series, sponsored by the library of Virginia.

Professor Berkey's piece, "This Community Is Not Yet Ready for Submission to Negro Indulgence: The 'Bologna Riot' and the Continuing Freedom Struggle in the Lower Shenandoah Valley," focused on a flashpoint in the ever-present racial tensions in Virginia's Lower Shenandoah Valley in the years following the Civil War. Dr. Gabriel Rieger

Dr. Gabriel Rieger's article, entitled "Give me your hand and say you will be mine': Containing Catholicism in Thomas Middleton's Measure for Measure", appeared in 52.2 of Religion and Literature (Notre Dame University). The article was the culmination of a lengthy research project and reconsiders Shakespeare's Measure for Measure in the context of the putative revisions undertaken by the playwright Thomas Middleton in 1620 in the midst of the Thirty Years War.

In addition to this, Dr. Rieger, Professor of English, served as dramaturge and textual editor for the Appalachian Shakespeare Project at Concord University's summer production of "Twelfth Night", a production which marked the return of the Appalachian Shakespeare Project to Concord University after hiatus in the summer of 2020.

He has also recently been approached to contribute a chapter to an anthology of Shakespeare criticism to be published by Palgrave Macmillan. The anthology is tentatively titled "New Directions in Shakespeare and Psychoanalysis."

Additionally, he has an article entitled "The Iron Queen and the Paper Crown: Imperial Anxiety in the Minor Tetralogy" forthcoming in volume 12 of The Selected Papers of the Ohio Valley Shakespeare Conference. That article examines the cultural and political implications of the character of Queen Margaret of Anjou in Shakespeare's minor tetralogy (Henry VI parts 1, 2, and 3, and Richard III).


