CLEP, PEP, and AP Policy Concord University (Revised June 2021)

In accordance with revised Board of Regents Policy Bulletin No. 29, Concord University will award credit for the College Level Examination Program (CLEP), the Proficiency Examination Program (PEP), and Advanced Placement Examinations (AP). To receive credit, the student must achieve a score equal to or above the recommended scores stated by Educational Testing Service (ETS), American College Testing Program (ACT), or the model policy scores set by the University of New York. General credit will be awarded where the student achieves at least the recommended score level. In some cases, Concord may set higher standards than called for by the guidelines in order to receive specific course credit. Where possible, the credit will be for specific Concord courses and general credit will be awarded where there are no appropriate specific courses.

In accordance with the spirit of Policy Bulletin No. 29 which states we will accept credit awarded by other institutions within the State system, Concord will also accept as transfer general credit, CLEP, PEP, and AP credit that has been awarded by other accredited institutions.

The list that follows below will provide the CLEP General and specific Subject Examination titles, minimum scores required, Concord equivalent courses, and credit hours awarded.

To register for the test you must indicate where you want to take the test and where you want the scores sent. Then you contact the testing center of your choice to schedule the test.

What Your **CLEP** Score Means

In order to reach the total score you see on your score report, two calculations are performed.

First, your "raw score" is calculated. This is the number of questions you answered correctly. Your raw score increases by one point for each question answered correctly, and no points are gained or lost when a question is not answered or is answered incorrectly.

Second, your raw score is converted into a "scaled score" by a statistical process called equating. Equating maintains the consistency of standards for test scores over time by adjusting for slight differences in difficulty between test forms. This ensures that your score does not depend on the specific test form you took or how well others did on the same form. Your raw score is converted to a scaled score that ranges from 20, the lowest, to 80, the highest. The final scaled score is the score that appears on your score report. The score scale is defined so that a scaled score of 50 corresponds to the score recommended by a panel of educators as the lowest score for which course credit should be granted.

To see whether you attained a score sufficient to receive college credit, compare your score to the score in the table shown. The scores that appear in this table are the credit-granting scores recommended by the American Council on Education (ACE). Each college, however, reserves the right to set its own credit-granting policy, which may differ from that of ACE. If you have not already done so, contact your college as soon as possible to find out the score it requires to grant credit, the number of credit hours granted and the course(s) that can be bypassed with a satisfactory score.

Please note that College-Level Examination Program® (CLEP®) examinations are developed and evaluated independently and are not linked to each other except by the program's common purpose, format, and method of reporting results. For this reason, direct comparisons should not be made between CLEP examinations in different subjects. CLEP scores are not comparable to SAT® scores or other test scores.

Test scores are kept on file for 20 years. During this period, score reports may be sent to an institution, but only at the request of the candidate. A Transcript Request Form and instructions for having a transcript sent to an institution can be downloaded from the CLEP website (collegeboard.org/clep) or obtained by contacting CLEP.

Candidates may not repeat an examination of the same title within the specified wait period of the initial testing date. If the candidate retakes the examination within the specified wait period, the administration will be considered invalid, the score will be canceled and any test fees will be forfeited. For military service members: effective December 11, 2010, DANTES does not fund retesting on a previously funded CLEP exam. However, service members may personally fund a retest after the specified wait period.
