Financial Aid and Business Office

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Students have settled into their classes but may feel overwhelmed and contemplate withdrawing from a class or two. Withdrawing from classes has an impact on future eligibility for financial aid. Colleges are required to have a Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) policy to determine if students are meeting a grade point average (GPA) requirement and completion ratio to ensure they are on pace to graduate within 150% of the program. Concord's SAP policy is located on our web page at www.concord.edu click on Quick Access then the Financial Aid link (scroll down to locate the policy). There are times it is better for a student to withdraw from a class than receive a failing grade but the class will count toward the completion ratio. Students must pass 67% of the classes they attempt. For example, a student enrolled in 12 hours withdraws from one class the completion ratio would be 75% (9 hrs earned divided by 12 hrs attempted) so the student is above the 67% requirement and is on pace. But if the student withdraws from two classes the completion ratio drops to 50% and the student is not meeting the 67% completion ratio requirement. Students not meeting any of the standards of the SAP policy are ineligible to receive financial aid in the future. Students are given one semester on a "Warning" status to correct the \square deficiency.

If after the warning semester, the student is still not meeting SAP he/she must appeal and be approved to receive aid in the future. Refer to the policy regarding the appeal process. If a student is ineligible for aid it does not matter how long he/she sits out they are always ineligible. The student will have to submit an appeal and be approved to be eligible to receive aid.

* In addition to meeting SAP to be eligible for financial aid, some awards have additional
 renewal criteria. For example WV students receiving the Promise Scholarship must
 complete 30 hours and meet a minimum GPA requirement to be eligible for the next year. If
 a student withdraws from a class, he/she may not meet the renewal criteria for a grant or
 scholarship.

 University! If you haven't ventured into the maelstrom of activity that is
 Marsh Library, this is your personal invitation to 'check out' the activity
 that encompasses all three floors (and the roof) of the library.

Work began on Monday morning immediately after May graduation. What seemed like a horde of Mongols invading Europe marched \square through each and every entrance of the library carrying concrete saws, pneumatic drills, jack-hammers, sledge hammers and every other tool known to man that could make noise was brought in and put to work. The once (almost) quiet sanctuary otherwise known as The Library suddenly became a cacophony of sound, a blur of activity and was enveloped in a never ending cloud of dust.

Crews of carpenters, plumbers, electricians, brick masons and a few
 jacks-of-all-trades began working ten hour days to replace the roof,
 install a new ADA restroom, upgrade the electrical system, install AIR
 CONDITIONING, rebuild the crumbling front steps, and replace
 windows in the main reading room. The windows were removed and
 blocked up sometime in the early 70's in an attempt to conserve
 energy.

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□While all of the construction was going on, your library staff was at work $_{\Box}$ as well. During the summer of 2013, every book in the library was moved...cart by cart, stack by stack, every book was shifted in an attempt to make better use of the space that is available. The end result is a ^C collection that flows smoothly from one section to another. The move ^oopened up a space on the top floor for a study area, as well as a small □lounge.

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As the construction is nearing completion, the staff of Marsh Library wants
 you to know that we are here to assist you. Whether you're a new student
 looking for room B8, or you need a rare text printed in the original Greek,
 or you have 10 minutes to get to class and have to print your 20 page
 paper, we are here to help you.

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Some of the services available to students are: free printing, a computer
lab that is open 16.25 hours each day Monday through Thursday; Friday
the library is open 7:45 a.m. - 4:00 p.m., Sat. 12:00 - 4:00 p.m., and
Sunday 2:00 - 10:00p.m.; During finals, the library is open 24 hours each
day. The library also offers Interlibrary loan service, reference assistance,
photocopying, notary service, a special collection of West Virginia
materials, a quiet study area, an eclectic grouping of DVD's, an array of
student art work, databases, graphic novels, and a new collection of
young adult reading material. Possibly the best service that the library has
to offer is a staff that is trained and available to help.

Construction continues...and will for several more weeks. The library
won't always be as quiet as we would like. It won't always be as dust free
as we would like, but, through clouds of dust and hordes of workmen, we
will continue to provide you, the students, faculty and staff of Concord

As part of his continuing efforts to involve secondary business education teachers in entrepreneurship education, **Dr. Mohan Pokharel**, attended the West Virginia Career and Technical Education Conference in Charleston, WV, July 23-35. At the conference, he presented to and networked with teachers about Concord's Entrepreneurship Initiatives including next June's teachers' training and the upcoming Entrepreneurship Initiatives Launch on September 9.

Division faculty hosted a professional development seminar on June 15-16 to help regional high school business teachers in West Virginia better prepare their students to participate in newly developed high school level statewide business plan competitions. Speakers and their topics included: Ideation, Dr. Fred Davidson; Entrepreneurial \square Accounting, Dr. Cynthia Khanlarian; Micro Foundation of Entrepreneurial Management, Dr. Charlotte Davis; Entrepreneurial Communication/Use of Technology, **Dr. Susan Robinett**; Entrepreneurial Finance, Dr. Andrey Zagorchev; Risk Assessment and Reflection, Dr. Muhammad Islam; Entrepreneurial Marketing, Dr. Bill Deck; and Strategic Entrepreneurship, Dr. Mohan Pokharel.

Student Highlights – Classroom Success

During the Fall 2012 and Spring 2013 semesters, students in the capstone course in Strategic Management participated in the computerized Capsim business simulation and surpassed the 90th percentile of points earned in the simulation's competition. Through the collective efforts of the students' performance on the simulation, Concord University was listed in Capsim's "Hall of Fame" of the global group of accomplished universities.

The Capsim simulation provides students with a venue to make integrated business decisions pulling from their degree program knowledge in computer operations, accounting, finance, management, marketing, and forecasting, and inculcates in them skills for competitive positioning, resource leveraging, and core competency enhancing strategies.
