CU Taking Proactive Approach Against H1N1 Virus

Athens, W.Va. - Concord University continues to take a proactive approach against a possible outbreak of the H1N1 virus (swine flu) as the illness spreads across the United States.

The University's Emergency Preparedness Team is focusing its efforts on prevention through common sense measures while being prepared in the event of an outbreak on campus.

"We're getting ahead of the curve," Mark Stella, chief of the University's police department and chairperson of the Emergency Preparedness Team, said. "We're prepared if we have some cases on campus."

Dr. Marjie Flanigan, Concord's interim vice president of student affairs and interim director of retention, stresses that common sense hygiene is key to preventing the spread of the H1N1 virus and seasonal influenza.

"Concord University is taking a proactive approach to make certain that the entire Concord community is focused on prevention," she said. "We want everybody to use common sense and use good hygiene and not take unnecessary risks."

"Our office is available to help parents and students to make sure everybody stays safe," she said.

Citing national guidelines established by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), Flanigan urges persons to wash their hands frequently and dispose of used tissues properly. In an effort to stay healthy, everyone should get proper rest, exercise and eat right, she said.

Last semester dispensers with hand sanitizer were installed near doorways of high-traffic areas at Concord. In addition, hand sanitizer and tissues continue to be distributed throughout the campus.

Increased efforts to cut down on germs have been integrated into routine cleaning by the University's custodians. "The custodial staff is taking extra precautions...wiping tables, door knobs, handrails, high traffic areas," Stella said.

According to the CDC, the following are everyday actions people can take to remain healthy:

- 1) Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
- 2) Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective.
- 3) Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread that way.
- 4) Try to avoid close contact with sick people.

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- 5) Influenza is thought to spread mainly person-to-person through coughing or sneezing of infected people.
- 6) If you get sick, the CDC recommends that you stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.

Concord officials are urging students, faculty and staff to stay home from class or work if they are sick to help control the spread of germs.

"If students need to miss class due to illness, they should contact their instructors by phone or e-mail or according to instructions provided in the course syllabus," Flanigan said.

Posters provided by the CDC and the Department of Health & Human Services, USA, are posted around the Concord campus alerting persons who feel sick to "stay home or in your residence, except to get medical care."

"The symptoms of novel H1N1 flu virus in people are similar to the symptoms of seasonal flu and include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills and fatigue," states the CDC web-site. "A significant number of people who have been infected with novel H1N1 flu virus also have reported diarrhea and vomiting."

"If you are sick, you may be ill for a week or longer. You should stay home and keep away from others as much as possible, including avoiding travel and not going to work or school, for at least 24 hours after your fever is gone except to get medical care or for other necessities," the CDC website says.

Accommodations Made For Student Over-Population

Due to the popularity of Concord University and ongoing retention efforts, the need for on-campus housing continues to expand and university administrators are accommodating the full house.

"The University is making a good faith effort to accommodate students with the priority being on access to education and not denying students the opportunity to realize their dreams," Concord University President Dr. Gregory F. Aloia said.

Concord University is implementing a modification to policy which will allow more juniors and seniors the option of living off-campus instead of in university housing. On campus, living space is being expanded with the reopening of five units in the college courts and by acquiring three modular units which will be fully functional by the end of the semester. And, students who are assigned to triple rooms will see an adjustment to the cost of living in the residence halls.

President Aloia said that the University's long-term strategic plan calls for an increase in housing units. Additionally, Concord University's Office of Residence Life and Housing is acting as a clearing house for students looking for off-campus housing opportunities.

In addition to accommodating increased housing needs, the University is also involved in an ongoing effort to enhance student life on campus.

Residence hall lounges are being renovated thanks to a fund-raiser held during the opening of the Fall 2008 semester. Through "Trading Spaces", Dr. Aloia stayed in a dormitory room and several students moved into his home for the first week of school. Pledges from the exchange were used for the renovations. Improvements to the lounge in Wilson Hall are 100 percent complete and are 90 percent complete in North and South towers and Sarvey Hall. The lounge in Wilson Hall will be completed in the near future.

Additional improvements on the Concord University campus in the last few years include completing a state-of-the-art fitness center in 2008; adding \$735,000 worth of new furnishings in North and South towers in the Summer of 2007; and, completing the ALEF house in 2009. The 2009-2010 school year will offer an increase in dining hall flex dollars for students.

In the area of student well-being the development of a 360-degree security camera system is in progress and will be completed during the coming academic year. The creation of the Athens-Concord substation for

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Princeton Fire and Rescue makes emergency care immediately available to all faculty, staff and students on campus.

"These improvements reflect the ongoing efforts of the University to create a better living environment for the students," President Aloia said.

Dining Hall Changes

Several changes have been made to dining services including additional Flex Dollars and a new food bar.

This semester students will receive an additional \$15 in Flex Dollars with either meal plan they select. This amount will also be added during the spring semester, a total of \$30 additional Flex Dollars.

Housing Director, Rick Dillon, said in the past 11 years, he cannot remember a Flex Dollar increase. "The flex dollar increase was negotiated in a package which included the new food bar, and extended dinner hours. The institution wanted a \$30.00 increase and Aramark happily agreed," Dillon said.

Dillon also said he believes there will be a "modest increase" next year as well.

Jeff Yeager, Student Government Association President, says students seem to be happy about the Flex Dollar increase. "It will allow them to buy a few more subs or hamburgers each semester," Yeager said. "Aramark's contract is up for renewal at the end of the year; therefore, there will be more negotiation room for Flex Dollar increases."

The new food bar is a stir-fry bar which cost around \$5,000. Existing personnel will operate this new bar. Additional electrical connections need to be made for the bar to be operational.

Yeager says he hopes to see a fruit bar in the future. He says he feels that "student money should go toward student services."

The dining hall enhancements were decided through a committee which was comprised of Marshall Campbell, Jeff Yeager, Dr. Chuck Becker, and Aramark management.

"Committee members had significant input and direction from both Jeff Yeager (advocating for the students) and Dr. Aloia. Dr. John David Smith also provided valuable advice and guidance," Housing Director Dillon said.

Resume writing workshops have already been held. In September, Dr. Aloia, CU President will present two workshops related to **Interview Success**.

There are many services available to your student relevant to their post graduation plans. Students should be encouraged to become familiar with the Career Service office by their sophomore year. Have you ever....


- * been alone away from home, and wished for someone to talk to?

- * wished you could do a little to help the cause of peace and understanding?



Then you should consider becoming a friend to an international student. A "friend" can be an individual, a couple, or a family, anyone who would like to know a student from another land and help him or her to understand our American way of life, our language, our customs, and our community.

QUESTIONS AND CONCERNS

What kinds of people make good international friends?



- * People who want to share their lives with others...you don't need to fit a "mold" of any kind... if you want to share your life with someone from another culture, you'll make a good friend to an international student.
- * People who have an interest in expanding their horizons...perhaps you are a world traveler or perhaps you have never been outside West Virginia...experience is less important than interest. You'll make a good friend to an international student if you want to be one!

How will I benefit?

You will gain a new level of understanding about yourself and our own country. The process of trying to explain an American holiday or our concepts of freedom or child rearing can help to clarify your own beliefs. Children learn first hand about the peoples and countries they study in school. Best of all, being a friend to international students gives you a window on the world through the medium of friendship-friendship, which can lead to letters, travel and new horizons.

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Can I choose the nationality of the student you assign to me?



On your application you may indicate a preference for a particular country if you wish. We always do our best to meet specified preferences. Our most well represented geographical areas are Asia, Europe and Africa.

What kind of food should I serve?



Almost anything is appropriate because the students are open-minded enough to try new dishes and want to learn about American food. However, it is wise to ask the student before hand if there are any foods that he or she can't eat for health or religious reasons.

How should I act?



- * Be yourself! The students are interested in learning about how Americans live, so do what you always do.
- * Involve children or grandchildren, if you have them; it is often easier for the visitor to relax first with them because of their openness and enthusiasm.
- * Show interest in the student's country, family, customs. They will also enjoy sharing such information with you.

What about religion?



International students come from a variety of religious backgrounds. Many are not Christian. While discussing and sharing information about each other's religious beliefs and practices can be interesting and informative, it is important to respect the student's beliefs. One should not befriend international students for the purpose of changing their religious beliefs.

What about money or financial problems?



As a condition of their admission, all international students at Concord University show full funding for the expenses of their studies and maintenance costs. When unexpected financial problems do arise, the staff of the International Student Office is prepared and trained to assist students in resolving their concerns. You are not expected to provide financial support of any kind.
