Concord University Service Council

The Concord University Student Organization Service Council is bringing civic responsibility and engagement to the Campus Beautiful. When you go across campus and see flyers about volunteering or events that organizations are participating in, chances are that the Service Council is involved. The Service Council is a group on campus that meets once a month to better organize and help organizations on campus with service events. The Service Council is also a member of Campus Compact, which is a group of Universities and their Presidents that make a commitment to community service. The universities involvement in Campus Compact is what started the Service Council.

Anna Hardy, the Interim Director of the Student Center and Student Activities, is also the director of the Service Council here at Concord. Hardy says that the Service Council is a great way to get all of our service activities on campus more organized and also to gain attendance and participation in the service meetings. Concord has an abundance of groups and organizations on campus, but the number of organizations that participates varies from meeting to meeting. "We are trying to get all organizations to have a member participate in the service council meetings," stated Hardy. Every organization that is an official organization on campus is required to have a service council representative, and attendance to the Service Council meetings is highly recommended. These meetings give the organization's representatives a heads up about what service events are going on in the coming month.

So far in this school year, the Service Council has only had two meetings. But great things are in store for the Service Council. Hardy said that many projects are coming up at Concord. For example, the Service Council has already enabled a school supply collection with the United Way. From the Service Council meeting, the Student Activities Committee and the United Way was able to pair up for a night of bingo to help collect these school supplies for needy children in the area. The Student Activities Committee was also helpful enough to donate prizes for that event as well. This is just one example of a great project that can come from the Service Council.

Attendance is also needed to increase at these meetings in order to help organizations become readily involved. Incentives are being offered such as raffles. For the first Service Council meeting, all those representatives in attendance got their name put into a raffle, and the winning representative got \$25 in Flex dollars. The next meetings raffle will be for a \$20 cash card.

In order to be involved, you must get involved, and that is exactly the message the Service Council is trying to get out there. Since every organization must already have a representative, participation is a must. The Service Council meets once a month on the first Tuesday of every month at 5pm in the State Room on campus. Concord Welcomes New Financial Aid Director

Concord University recently brought in a new director for the financial aid office. After interviewing many candidates, CU decided on Debra Turner.

"The office is very excited about our new director and ready to work on new ideas of how to improve the financial aid process," Lisa Spencer, financial aid advisor, said. "We interviewed several candidates but Mrs. Turner brought so much prior knowledge and experience in financial aid. She has a wonderful personality and is very student oriented."

Turner has worked in financial aid for 21 years and has experience as an assistant director, associate director, and director.

"I liked that Concord University is a smaller college and is part of the four-year university system," Turner said. "When I came for the interview I felt comfortable immediately and could tell that people liked working at the college."

Before moving to Athens, Turner lived the past two years in Bainbridge, GA. Prior to that, she spent most of her life in Virginia. Having lived in Princeton before, Turner said she is familiar with the area.

"Athens is beautiful," she said. "It has a country setting and is convenient to other cities. Students, faculty and staff have welcomed me and have been very helpful."

Turner said Concord University is different from the school she worked at in Bainbridge. "Bainbridge College is a two-year public college," she said. "There were no residence halls and a larger non-traditional student population. Prior to Bainbridge College I worked at two four-year institutions, one public and one private."

Turner believes financial aid is the most important aspect of college for every student. This is why she said she wants students to be as informed as possible about the process.

"Having been a college student, the parent of a college student, and an administrator I can relate to all aspects of the financial aid process," she said. "I know how important financial aid is and how confusing the process can be. I want students to have information as soon as possible and understand the various types of financial aid so they can make informed decisions."

"I have experienced staff and we work together to ensure students receive the same level of service as in the past," she added.

She said she is also taking steps to ensure that Concord students get the best service possible concerning their financial aid. She plans to improve the financial aid department by reviewing the current processes to see what is working and what processes need improvement.

A Message From The New Financial Aid Director

The Financial Aid Office has under gone several changes this fall. The transition to Direct Lending for student loans has gone well. Students and parents who borrowed loans in prior years and a direct loan this year will have at least two monthly payments when they begin repayment. A Direct Consolidation Loan allows a borrower to consolidate (combine) multiple federal student loans into one loan. The result is a single monthly payment.

HOMESTAY PROGRAM AT CONCORD UNIVERSITY

The Homestay Program at Concord University provides an opportunity for American families to learn about other countries and cultures by having an international student stay in their home during university breaks. In turn, the international student benefits by being able to practice English conversation and learn about American culture first hand in the comfortable, friendly environment of an American home.

Have you ever....

- * been alone away from home, and wished for someone to talk to?
- * wanted to know more about another country or culture?
- * wanted to make friends with someone different from you?
- * wished you could do a little to help the cause of peace and understanding?

Then you should consider becoming a friend to an international student. A "friend" can be an individual, a couple, or a family, anyone who would like to know a student from another land and help him or her to understand our American way of life, our language, our customs, and our community.

QUESTIONS AND CONCERNS

What kinds of people make good international friends?

- * Single people, couples, people with children, retired people... neither your marital status nor your age is a factor.
- * People who want to share their lives with others...you don't need to fit a "mold" of any kind... if you want to share your life with someone from another culture, you'll make a good friend to an international student.
- * People who have an interest in expanding their horizons...perhaps you are a world traveler or perhaps you have never been outside West Virginia...experience is less important than interest. You'll make a good friend to an international student if you want to be one!

How will I benefit?

You will gain a new level of understanding about yourself and our own country. The process of trying to explain an American holiday or our concepts of freedom or child rearing can help to clarify your own beliefs. Children learn first hand about the peoples and countries they study in school. Best of all, being a friend to international students gives you a window on the world through the medium of friendship-friendship, which can lead to letters, travel and new horizons.

Can I choose the nationality of the student you assign to me?

On your application you may indicate a preference for a particular country if you wish. We always do our best to meet specified preferences. Our most well represented geographical areas are Asia, Europe and Africa.



What kind of food should I serve?



Almost anything is appropriate because the students are open-minded enough to try new dishes and want to learn about American food. However, it is wise to ask the student before hand if there are any foods that he or she can't eat for health or religious reasons.

How should I act?

- * Be yourself! The students are interested in learning about how Americans live, so do what you always do.
- * Involve children or grandchildren, if you have them; it is often easier for the visitor to relax first with them because of their openness and enthusiasm.
- * Show interest in the student's country, family, customs. They will also enjoy sharing such information with you.

What about religion?

International students come from a variety of religious backgrounds. Many are not Christian. While discussing and sharing information about each other's religious beliefs and practices can be interesting and informative, it is important to respect the student's beliefs. One should not befriend international students for the purpose of changing their religious beliefs.

What about money or financial problems?

As a condition of their admission, all international students at Concord University show full funding for the expenses of their studies and maintenance costs. When unexpected financial problems do arise, the staff of the International Student Office is prepared and trained to assist students in resolving their concerns. You are not expected to provide financial support of any kind.

What do I do if there is a problem I can't solve?

Contact the International Students Office. We're here to help.

Software Developed at Concord University Part of State Fair Exhibit

ATHENS - eigenwegTM is traveling to the state fair.

The eigenwegTM system, an innovation that provides a one-stop digital source for tourist information, will be demonstrated at Concord University's tent at the State Fair of West Virginia Aug. 13-20, 2010. The tent will be located behind the grandstand from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily.

Eigenweg (pronounced ike-en-vek) translated from Dutch means "my way."

The software is a product of Concord University research and development team Dr. W.R. Winfrey, professor of mathematics, and Miranda N. Martin, a 2009 Concord graduate and Oak Hill native. Their work is based in the Rahall Technology Center on Concord's Athens campus.

"eigenwegTM is a solution to a fundamental problem in the tourism industry, i.e. connecting brochures to digital sources of information about tourist attractions," Winfrey said. "This is provided via a kiosk in a tourist information center, a hotel lobby, an airport, a railway station or a ferry terminal. Also, it can be provided via a smartphone and a website. The digital information is accessed via a QR code (a two-dimensional bar code) printed on a brochure or in advertising."

Inspiration for the software came about from discussions Winfrey and Martin had with Jerry E. Berry, president of Three Rivers Travel Council and an occupant of the Rahall Technology Center's business incubator. In his work Berry has encountered a problem with traditional printed brochures adequately reaching the tourist audience.

"Tourism literature, either a brochure or an advertisement, is limited by what can be displayed on a printed page," Winfrey explained. "It's not always simple to get to additional sources of information, such as the attraction's website. It is not practical to customize brochures to a particular point of distribution.

"The eigenwegTM system offers better interaction between selected attractions and potential customers, plus an integrated view of all local attractions, large and small. It sells the region, not just individual attractions and offers a common interface for all attractions. It does not replace brochures and web sites but, instead, adds to their value," he said. "Also, it offers affordable global access for small local attractions."

Berry serves as distributor of the system through eigenwegUSA. He says that while the product was inspired by the tourism industry, eigenwegTM is now being used by the business world as well.
